After several months of hard work, we finally found a location that will match our needs in a new and updated way. Our new space will give us the opportunity to upgrade our recording equipment and provide an even better audio experience for our listeners. We hope to expand from having four booths (sound

pods) to five – including one that is specifically ADA. We are also excited to refresh scripts for volunteers, add new reading materials, and update furniture and chairs for the office!

In the next few weeks, we will be announcing our official moving schedule and the plan for our tentative studio shutdown. We will need some time to move our broadcasting equipment from our current office to our new one! Don't worry – this will not cause interruptions for our listeners. They will still be able to access our 24/7 broadcast on the device of their choosing! In fact, you'll be able to listen on a new device soon, but more on that later.

Something that sticks out to me during all of this is the admiration I have for our volunteers. Every day they show up

with smiles, ready to record, catch up on chitchat, and remind us how we've stayed on air for almost 35 years. Since announcing the move, we have felt nothing but support from our community and it is truly humbling. We are excited for the future and for the next 35 years!


# Long-time Listener in Winchester

Richard Muncie, a resident of Winchester in Clark County, first noticed a diminution in his vision beginning when he was six or seven years old, causing difficulty seeing the teacher's chalkboard writings in his elementary school classroom. "Vision loss runs in the family," he told Radio Eye. He and his family loved reading the Citizen's Voice & Times newspaper, formerly published in nearby

Irvine, Kentucky.

Richard learned of Radio Eye about a decade ago when he and his wife purchased a computer specially outfitted for users with visual impairment. They received a brochure about Radio Eye with their purchase and reached out to our office soon after. Since then, Ricard has received an FM-radio, an internet radio, and, most recently, an Amazon Alexa to listen to our broadcasts and podcast recordings.

Richard estimates that he listens to Radio Eye for an average of 1.5 hours each day. His favorite programs are the Lexington Herald-Leader as well as the new broadcasts of the Washington Post, which began this summer after the Herald-Leader cut back to only three print editions per week. He also enjoys the Country Weekly and Mystery Mix-Up programs, and makes a point to listen to the Winchester Sun newspaper, broadcast early on Saturday afternoon each week. "Radio Eye has a lot of really good



programming," Richard said, "and they broadcast a lot of good books during the holidays at Thanksgiving and Christmas!"

Having impaired vision means Richard has never held a driver's license and has limited mobility. He enjoys walking in downtown Winchester and supporting some of the local businesses near his home on North Main Street. When at home, he also enjoys listening to music and keeps informed about local, state, and national news on commercial FM radio stations in addition to Radio Eye.

## Thank you, Faith!

Radio Eye was grateful to have Faith Steffey, a December 2025 Transylvania University graduate, as our student intern over the summer. While taking classes and working full time in the kitchen at 33 Staves, Faith put in one hundred hours with Radio Eye, organizing our file library and helping us establish a database for our book recordings. # A New Way to Listen



Radio Eye is contracting with Louis Callaway from Clear Lake, Iowa to create a Radio Eye phone application that will allow listeners to listen to our Lexington livestream and select podcasted programs from their smart devices. It will be available from both the Google Play Store and Apple Stores (so both Android and iPhone) and will be free for listeners.

Louis got his start creating a custom app for IRIS, Iowa's reading service, while he was still in college. Since then, he has created similar apps for Sun Sounds of Arizona and Mind's Eye in Central Illinois. The interface is simple to navigate, easy to read (both visually and for assistive readers), and user-friendly. On the left is a screenshot of the beta version of our app, which will soon have expanded programming.

### Funding our New Booths

Radio Eye would like to thank two very generous donors who have stepped up to fundthe first two recording booths for our new location! As we revealed in our announcement video, most of Radio Eye's recording booths in our new space will be individual sound-proof recording "pods." Although sound-proof booths have long been used for recording, their popularity in office spaces has surged in the last few years, giving rise to new styles and increased availability. Using pods like this will give Radio Eye more flexibility in future and simplify the move by reducing the amount of build-out that we need to do.

Bluegrass Career Services, a division of Employment Solutions, is a first-time donor to Radio Eye funding one of our new recording booths. The Lexington-based group helps folks with disabilities or barriers to employment to find and maintain jobs through workshops, one-on-one coaching, transitional support, working with employers, educational access, and more. Thank you so much for choosing to support us!

Second, the Kentucky School for the Blind Charitable Foundation was kind enough to sponsor one of the sound booths for our new location in addition to their generous annual grant. Although their focus is on the Kentucky School for the Blind in Louisville, KSBCF's broader mission is to support access to assistive technologies and other vital supports in the blind and visually impaired community. KSBCF has now given nearly \$175,000 to Radio Eye over the past 17 years.

Radio Eye staff and volunteers attended KSBCF's annual fundraiser dinner in September, which was "Cheeseburger in Paradise" themed and included a grill-out style menu, margaritas, and flower necklaces for every attendee! Kentucky School for the Blind alum TaMyah Jordan was the keynote speaker, discussing her experiences and work as a student at UK and highlighting the role that KSBCF scholarships have played in the opportunities that she has had to further her education and serve her community.

## Our Eye on Country Music

Radio Eye has been fortunate to have several volunteers with professional radio experience over the years, and volunteer Ken Dawkins has been a rock for us for the past five. While enjoying his retirement with his wife Tracy in Richmond, Ken has been giving back to the community through offering his vocal talents to Radio Eye.

Ken began volunteering with us just prior to the COVID-19 shutdown, throughout which he read the Grocery Show and several local newspapers, filling in on Country Weekly when needed. Eventually he took over the program, continuing a fifteen year tradition which began with Larry Hurt, a long time volunteer and former Radio Eye board member. The two met for the first time at our Fall 2023 volunteer appreciation at RD-1 Distillery's Lexington tasting room and spent the evening sharing

stories of preparing and recording this program for us over the years. Ken has developed a great appreciation for what Larry began, taking considerable time to research the topics, record, edit, and mix the program from his home recording studio each week.

"Thinking about the listener, first and foremost," is Ken's mantra in producing Country Weekly, which airs early every Friday afternoon and outlines news and information about all things

related to country music, such as artists, concerts, awards, and events. Ken's many talents shine in producing this weekly program, and as he puts it, "entertainment is a break to the (hard) news" aired before and after his program. He begins each program with some jazzy intro music, which he discovered, and which echoes his true love of music as "a jazz enthusiast!"



Ken was raised on Long Island - "I'm not from the South, but I got here as soon as I could!" he says - with classical music, learning to play the flute and saxophone in his youth. His professional career began behind the microphone in radio stations in Berlin, NH and Federalsburg, MD, and after a few years he advanced into sales. From there, he became a high-level manager at the Black & Decker national headquarters in the northeast. Ken moved to Central

Kentucky in 2000 as the vice president of North American sales for Thiel Audio, then worked with the Quantrell Auto Group for the decade before his retirement in 2019.

Radio Eye is so fortunate to have Ken as a long-term volunteer. Even if you don't follow or listen to Country Music, consider tuning in to his program every Friday at 12:30 PM or 5:30 PM ET to enjoy one of our listener's favorite programs!
